HAPPY LABOR DAY! VOTE NO ON THE RECALL

The Building Trades and all of organized labor are rallying voters to reject the recall of California Governor Gavin Newsom.

The effort to remove Newsom, a labor-friendly Democrat, is "a sneak attack on our jobs, wages, benefits and unions," labor leaders say.

The election is Tuesday, Sept. 14, with ballots already sent to all California registered voters. Voters can return ballots by mail or in person, or vote in person between Sept. 4 and Sept. 14.

CITY VOTES \$2.7 BILLION IN WORK

Deepening the city's commitment to the use of Project Labor Agreements, the Los

Angeles City Council on June 29 unanimously approved an agreement with the LA/Orange Counties Building and Con-

PRST STD U.S. POSTAGE PAID LOS ANGELES CA. Permit NO. 31327 struction Trades Council that will govern work on about \$2.7 billion in public works projects until 2030, creating thousands of new construction jobs with union standards each year.

The city awarded its first public works construction project with a PLA in January of 2001 and in 2010 it authorized the city's Public Works Department's first blanket, multi-project PLA for five years, which later was extended another five years.

The latest PLA is the city's first 10-year commitment and, according to city and



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
FROM THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Local 250 Steamfitters/Pipefitters, went before the U.S. Senate and testified in front of the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee, U.S. Senator Arlen Specter, regarding asbestos legislation.

Jerry is also a Founder of the Mesothelioma Research Foundation of America (www.mesorfa.org), along with his wife, Elizabeth Ann Paul, Executive Director, and Jim W. Kellogg, retired International Representative of the California Pipe Trades and past Vice President of the State Building and Construction Trades Council of California, who have all served as Board Members since 2001. Since this time, we undertook the successful funding and opening of a mesothelioma research lab at USC/Norris Comprehensive Medical Center in Los Angeles under the direction of Lab Director Dr. Parkash Gill. Over the past 19 years novel new treatment options Veglin, which went through FDA-approved clinical trials phase 1 and 2, and now EPH B4, in FDA-approved clinical trials phase 1, have helped expand the depth of research and expand the types of treatment options. This offers greater hope to those afflicted with asbestos-caused cancer, with options not previously available.

None of this could have been done without the support of the Building and Construction Trades Council of California and also Southern California Pipe Trades District Council 16, the Heat & Frost Insulators 16, along with the support from the Western States Conference, and all their able leaders and supporting local unions.

As asbestos disease and mesothelioma tend to surface later in life, we recommend workers take a chest X-ray screening every three years where the results are examined by a certified B reader radiologist, a doctor who is additionally trained to know what is and is not an asbestos marker and asbestosis. Plus you will increase your chance of discovery at an early stage, should you have lung cancer, which would likely respond better to treatment options.

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EVERYTHING YOU WANT TO KNOW ABOUT UNIONS

What Is the Labor Movement?

Labor unions are groups of workers organizing and taking collective action to improve their lives.

There are approximately 15 million workers in unions and employee associations in the United States and approximately 4.5 million union workers in Canada.

What Do Unions Do?

Unions are the principal means for workers to organize and protect their rights on the job. The union contract or "collective bargaining agreement" establishes the basic terms and conditions of work.

A Project Labor Agreement is a collective bargaining agreement covering a specific project or set of projects. Unions give workers a voice with employers and provide a means to gain a

measure of security and dignity on the job.

Unions pursue strategies and activities that serve the interests of their members. These include representing members and negotiating with employers, recruiting new members and engaging in political action when necessary to support policies that improve working conditions for all workers.

What Is Collective Bargaining?

The simple phrase, 'collective bargaining,' involves hundreds of thousands of union members in the process.

Representatives of labor and management negotiate over wages and benefits, hours and working conditions. The settlement they reach is spelled out in

a written document—a contract. The contract normally contains a grievance procedure to settle disputes. The union's job is to enforce the contract on behalf of the members.

It has not been easy to establish collective bargaining as a permanent part of American life. The efforts of unions to establish the concept of collective bargaining are a little-known, but very important part of American history, involving great sacrifice and bitter struggle. Historically, management

took the position that because they owned the means of production, they had the sole right to determine the conditions of employment.

Collective bargaining forms the cornerstone of industrial democracy.

Why Are Unions Important?

Workers formed unions so that they could have influence over wages, hours, working conditions, and the many other problems that arise in the workplace. Unions help set the standards for education, skill levels, wages, working conditions, and quality of life for workers. Unionnegotiated wages and benefits are generally better than what non-union workers receive.

Most union contracts provide far more protections than state and federal laws. For example, in many states there is no legal right for workers to take a break.

Most states follow a legal doctrine called "employment at will," and non-union workers can be fired for almost any reason, any time.

Unions work to establish laws improving job conditions for their members through legislation at the national, state and local level. This ultimately benefits all workers. The eight-hour work day is an example of a positive change won by unions that affects everyone.

Are Unions Still Important to Working People Today?

Unions are more important than ever. Far more workers would join unions if anti-union campaigns weren't so common. Misinformation and intimidation—including firing union supporters—are routine responses

when workers try to form unions. In a global economy, the nature of work is changing and some employers resist unions.

Workers have less power when they act individually, but acting together as a group they can effect real change. Unions are the collective voice of workers. Unions are the workers' watchdogs, using their power to ensure that workers' rights under the law are protected.

In addition to ensuring fairness and equitable treatment, many employers recognize that there are advantages to offering workers better wages and benefits. Companies concerned about long-term profitability want to maintain a supply of skilled labor and minimize turnover. The basic reason for this is simple: If unions provide a voice to workers, the number of dissatisfied workers who leave is reduced.

Why Join a Labor Union? As a worker, you have a feder-

ally guaranteed right to form or join a union, and bargain collectively with your employer. Business agents and/or stewards are the representatives of the union who help workers deal with unfair treatment, discrimination and other workplace issues. This helps balance the power that an employer has over individual employees.

Belonging to a union gives you rights under the law that you do not have as an individual. Once you have formed a union, your employer must bargain with your union over

your wages, benefits, hours and working conditions.

Union workers, on average, earn higher wages and get more benefits than workers who don't have a union.

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


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



BUILDING TRADES HEALTH: KAISER PERMANENTE ADVICE

FLU SHOT IS EXTRA-IMPORTANT NOW

Getting your flu shot this year will be physician lead. more important than ever, health experts advise, because of the coronavirus pan-

Every year, physicians recommend getting vaccinated as a way to protect yourself against contracting or spreading influenza. But this year, our health crisis has made this single act of preventative care especially critical to protecting yourself from a disease that plagues millions.

"The flu virus will weaken your immune system, making you more vulnerable to catching other respiratory infections, including Covid-19, and that's why getting vaccinated this year is so important," said Dr. Margaret Khoury, an infectious disease specialist who is Kaiser Permanente Southern California's Covid-19 and influenza vaccination program

During the 2018-2019 flu season:

She noted that having the flu and Covid-19 at the same time would be devastating to your health. "The influenza vaccine remains the most effective prevention against contracting the flu and its complications," Dr. Khoury explained.

Every year, millions of people get the flu, and hundreds of thousands of individuals end up in the emergency room or hospitalized with severe complications, said Dr. David Bronstein, who also practices at Kaiser Permanente Southern California.

"We're preparing for a worse influenza season this year," he noted. "Last year, we didn't see many flu cases, possibly due to the precautions we all took and because the coronavirus crowded out the flu. While it was fortunate that we didn't experience a 'twindemic,' it is concerning because so

many of us didn't build up any immunity from flu exposure last year. That means a lot more people will be more vulnerable this year, which is why it's very important that we all protect ourselves and our loved ones this flu season by getting our annual flu shot."

Dr. Khoury said getting the flu vaccine is very important, but especially for the most sensitive populations. They include the elderly, pregnant women, children younger than 5, and those with chronic health conditions, she explained.

Studies show there are significant health-related inequities in flu vaccination rates and flu-related complications, particularly in the Black and Latino communities. According to the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention, Blacks and Latinos experience disproportionately higher rates of chronic health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease and obesity. These chronic health conditions place many Blacks and Latinos at a higher risk of severe flu complications, which is why it's so critically important for them to get vaccinated.

"A common misconception is that a flu shot will give you the flu," Dr. Bronstein noted. "That's simply not true. You cannot contract the flu from getting a flu shot. Side effects, when they do occur, are typically very mild. However, by not getting vaccinated, you put yourself and your loved ones at a greater risk of getting the flu, which causes serious illness, hospitalizations and thousands of deaths each year."



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

in the country," said Art Pulaski, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the California Labor Federation. "This reckless recall threatens our values as Californians, and will be met with strong opposition from working people across the state."

Voters will face two questions: Whether to recall Newsom, and who should replace him if he is recalled.

Chris Hannan, Executive Secretary of the Los Angeles/Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council, said Newsom is by far the better Governor for union families than any candidate on the recall ballot.

"We urge a 'No' vote on recalling Newsom," Hannan said. "We have had our disagreements with the Governor. But

he has always been at the table with us. He backs major infrastructure projects and the enforcement of prevailing wage. Some of these candidates don't even support a minimum wage, let alone a fair wage with benefits and worker protections

"California does not need to take this step backward."

Recall Disrupts Our Work

Robbie Hunter, President of the State Building and Construction Trades Council of California, said a recall would be a direct blow to the Building Trades.

Newsom is currently working with the Building Trades to gain funds for the state from the trillions of dollars being assembled for a federal infrastructure package.

"The disruption of a recall could very well translate to the loss of thousands of jobs in construction," Hunter said. "We need to be at the table when these funding decisions are made."



The Building Trades say "No" to the recall of

"The recall is a sneak attack on our jobs, wages, benefits and unions.,

Hunter said that while other states shut down construction during the Covid pandemic in 2020 and 2021, Newsom worked with the Building Trades to keep workers on the job.

"For that alone, Newsom has done much more than any of these other candidates would do," Hunter said. "We did not suffer the devastating unemployment that our brothers and sisters in other states did."

At an Aug. 7 "No on Recall" rally, Joel Barton, Business Manager of IBEW Local 11, said Newsom's pro-worker policy had a strong local impact.


"Throughout the pandemic, Governor

say. They are urging members simply to vote "no" on the recall, whether voting by a mail-in ballot or in person.

Vote By Mail or In Person

The Los Angeles and Orange County Registrars of Voters have voting instructions on their websites and social media. On those sites you can find the nearest secure ballot drop-off sites, which already have posted hours of operation and will be available through Election Day, Sept. 14.

Alternatively, you can take your sealed ballot to a post office or mailbox and it will be counted as long as it is postmarked by Election Day and received within seven days by the Registrar of Voters. No postage is required.

Or you can drop off your ballot at any in-person voting center when those centers open beginning Saturday, Sept. 4.

The traditional process of filling out a ballot and casting it at a voting center also will be available from Sept. 4 to Sept. 14 at 8 pm.

Besides giving voters a chance to recall Newsom, the ballot asks them to choose Newsom's successor if he is ousted. 



union officials, the longer term recognizes the effectiveness of the PLA in getting projects completed on time and on budget while setting targets to provide apprenticeship training and good-paying jobs to local residents, people of color, women, military veterans, the formerly incarcerated and others who are disadvantaged.

Ron Miller, who retired as Executive Secretary of the Los Angeles/Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council July 30, said he considers this accomplishment one of the most satisfying of his career. "This speaks to the success we have had in the past with these agreements, in the country's most dynamic city for building. It is important for members of the Building and Construction Trades and also important for the community."

Lifelong Careers

Miller said the PLA continues to be the strongest tool for bringing in local residents to reap lifelong careers from the massive investment in city projects.

For the first time, the city's PLA will also target graduates of the Building Trades' MC3 apprenticeship-readiness courses. These authorized programs offer people a chance to learn about the various Trades, hone basic job-preparation skills they will need and decide whether to enter one of the career-track apprenticeships.





residents, including journeymen and apprentices, which exceeds the target.

In all, these projects have paid more than \$64 million in wages and benefits to construction workers living in or near the

"We are really proud of the Project Labor Agreement and proud of our partnership with the Trades," said Greg Good, President of the Los Angeles City Board of Public Works. "The Building Trades

deserve an enormous amount of credit for being leaders and partners in delivering major capital projects for Angelenos."

The new agreement covers 188 anticipated projects, up from 116 in the previous agreement. They represent a wide variety of public works such as a multi-milliondollar renovation of the famous Hollywood Walk of Fame; a new ice and roller skating rink on a now-unused two-acre lot in Reseda; development of the 3.8-mile LA Streetcar circuit in downtown Los Angeles; construction of a 169,000-squarefoot office building called the Clean Water Campus in Lincoln Heights for the city Bureau of Sanitation, and a multitude of sewers and stormwater facilities.

"These are crucial projects where a skilled and trained workforce is of the highest importance," said Chris Hannan, the new Council Executive Secretary.

More Projects to Come

Only projects planned for the first five years are named in the agreement, with others to be added later.

Good said that besides guaranteeing that projects are completed cost efficiently and safely, the PLA has proved to be "a crucial vehicle through which we are able to ensure as much opportunity as possible for disadvantaged and transitional workers in our community, veterans, and folks coming out of our criminal justice system, foster care and shelters.'

He said the addition of apprenticeshipreadiness graduates in the targeted hiring mix "helps to ensure that folks are well prepared for the apprenticeship programs. It is another level of training."

Reamer said the city is eager to join the SEE LA CITY PAGE 36



The Paseo del Rio is the first project of the new 100 Acre Partnership, made up of the California Department of Parks and Recreation (State Parks), the City of Los Angeles and the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority. Paseo del Río will be a one-mile-long riverfront walkway, with amenities, developed with extensive community input. The site is east of the LA River and west of



In the two-mile stretch of Pacific Coast Highway from Chautauqua to Temescal Canyon Road, there is no pedestrian access to the beach from the inland side of PCH. That will change when Building Trades union members construct a pedestrian bridge over PCH to connect Will Rogers State Beach with the George Wolfberg Park at Potrero Canyon. "This will save lives," community activist David Card said. "People would hike down Potrero Canyon and see the ocean and then would jump the fence and try to run across PCH.
